We are also very excited that all pupils in school will be participating in 'Poetry by Heart' during the spring term. We are holding our own partnership version of this national event where every year group is attempting to learn two poems (short and long) off by heart. # **Curriculum and Enrichment**

# Nursery

In nursery this month, we have been welcoming more new friends. It has been lovely watching the current children show their kind and caring manners 'nursery love' towards our new friends. We really are one big happy and loving nursery family. Please say a warm welcome to our new friends and their parents if you see them at the beginning or end of the nursery day.

We have been exploring winter this month as it has been the perfect weather to really help us understand and engage in hands-on experiences. With the recent freezing temperatures, we even experienced a little snow! We have loved exploring pretend snow and watching what happens when we drop ice on the playground floor. Recently we have been reading and talking about the traditional tale, The Three Little Pigs. We have been practising our best 'big bad wolf' voices and 'little pig' voices when exploring the story with our nursery practitioners.

The practitioners at nursery are continuing to support the children with developing their self-care and independence. With this in mind, we have been teaching the children the 'whoosh and swoosh' method when putting on a coat. Please ask a member of the nursery team to show you how to use this method at home.

Nursery have a growing collection of unlabelled clothing, please label your child's clothing so we can safely get them back to you. If you have lost an item of clothing, please ask a nursery practitioner to look through the lost property with you.

#### Year R

Year R children have had a lovely Spring Term. Our role play corner has been transformed into a Chinese New Year house and the children have loved playing in it. We have learnt all about Chinese New Year, role played the story of the animals and made labels. In writing we have been looking at stories by Jill Murphy including Peace at Last, Five Minutes Peace, Piece of Cake and Whatever Next! We have linked these to our units of work and written party invitations for our own versions of the story. We looked at the book Oi Frog! and wrote our own rhymes. In mathematics, we have been learning how to tell and read the time to o'clock. We have been looking at adding, repeating patterns and ordinal numbers. We loved racing our toy cars and giving them a 1st, 2nd, 3rd, 4th rosette. We had a fantastic visit from the teddy bears hospital. They taught us all about the importance of healthy eating and about the different parts of our body. We learnt about how doctors can help us when we are sick and we got to use some of the doctor's tools on our teddy bears.

#### Year 1

Year 1 have been working consistently hard this term and making lots of progress in their reading, writing and mathematics. In English, we have been writing WANTED posters about the Gruffalo who has been spotted getting up to mischief in the school. Luckily, our posters have warned everybody he is on the loose and included a description of what he looks like and what naughty things he has done! Our next task is to write our own Gruffalo story. In maths, we have been learning about place value to 20 and adding numbers



by counting on. In other subjects such as D.T. we have started to investigate mechanisms and created our own gingerbread men sliders. The class have really enjoyed learning about the continents in Geography and specifically what life is like in Africa. Well done Year 1 you have made a great start to the New Year!

#### Year 2

Since our return from the Christmas holidays, Year 2 has been exceptionally busy, engaging in a variety of enriching activities. We had the fire service visit, who taught us about the critical importance of fire alarms and equipped us with essential knowledge on handling fire emergencies. In mathematics, we've been learning about multiplication and division, which has been building upon the knowledge acquired in Year 1. This has allowed us to deepen our understanding of these concepts. Our focus in writing has centered around crafting suspenseful narratives and in order to do this we've paid attention to setting descriptions and considered their impact on the reader's experience. The ever-popular phonics workshops, held once a fortnight, continue to be a favourite with the children. These sessions provide an engaging and interactive platform for enhancing phonetic awareness and literacy skills. We've showcased our artistic talents by creating chequered flags through the application of weaving skills. Inspired by the book, The Snow Day, we've also brought our own skiers to life, combining literature with hands-on creativity.

#### Year 3



During the spring term, we have become explorers of Ancient Egypt. How did they build the pyramids? Who discovered Tutankhamun? What did Ancient Egyptians invent? We have been finding out! As explorers, we have been getting into the role of people living during this time, from Pharaohs to priests to peasants. What a wonderful and different life they lived! Our most interesting debate this term has been around who built the pyramids? The children were exceptionally eloquent in explaining their opinions and were able to improve valuable speaking and

listening skills at the same time.

In writing, we have been exploring a text called, Wisp - A Story of Hope. The illustrations are beautiful, sharing a story of hopelessness turning into hopefulness. The colours, rich vocabulary and illustrations have helped us to gain a clearer understanding of what hope is. As the topic has progressed, we have been linking the theme of hope to refugees. We care deeply as a school about being a School of Sanctuary and had a great opportunity to explore the concept in more depth – having rich discussions about our wider world has helped us to develop our empathy. We can't wait to share our final poems with you all.

#### Year 4

Year 4 had an excellent start to the New Year and have been excited to explore a range of fantasy and spooky settings to encourage use of figurative techniques. They have loved getting to write similes and using personification to describe the intriguing wizarding world, specifically the magical town of Diagon Alley. We are all very excited to create out final drafts of our writing next week and publish what has been an excellent writing journey.

Another thrilling topic was the Vikings and their invasion of Lindesfarne. The children have been having exciting debates over whether the Vikings can be remembered as brutal savages or a skilled civilisation. Since our lesson uncovering a range of items from Viking excavations, 21 out of 30 children have been persuaded that they were, according to our majority judgement, a civilised society! We have explored a range of non-fiction texts in reading, one of our favourites being, Viking Voyagers, showcasing beautiful pages full of intriguing Viking facts.

#### Year 5

In Year 5 we have been exploring living things in science. We have worked hard on understanding the lifecycle of both animals and plants, from variations of birth to full grown adults. It has been particularly interesting seeing how garlic can grow and sprout without an insect for pollination. In English, we have been understanding the vast, majestic wilderness of Alaska and creating settings that inspire awe and wonder within the reader. We have loved investigating the landscape and recognising our own emotions, responding to beautiful mountains and stunning valleys. In mathematics, we have been investigating fractions. We can now confidently find equivalent fractions, simplify and convert between mixed and improper fractions. Soon, we will be adding, subtracting and multiplying, using our accumulated knowledge.

#### Year 6

In writing, we have written an action-packed narrative of the Macbeth story: some children focused on a battle scene whereas others delved into Macbeth's mind to understand his feelings. Our work in mathematics has focused around ratio, fractions and algebra. The links the children have made between this have been encouraging and enabled them to be flexible in their approach to problem solving where these concepts are required. Our geography topic has been explosive! We have enjoyed learning about natural disasters such as volcanoes and understanding what causes them as well as the impact caused. We have had a particular moral question to investigate related to the White Island tourist incident off the coast of New Zealand. We have discovered that it is not easy to predict eruptions but that organisations also have a duty to safeguard the people they serve. In science, we have been looking at the history of evolution and understanding how we have gathered this knowledge about our past. We are very proud of the progress made by the children so far this year.

# Year 6 Residential to Skern Lodge

Year 6 are becoming very excited about the residential to Skern Lodge in July. Many parents are paying in regular instalments and I would like to thank you for ensuring these are up to date. Full payment needs to be made by **Thursday 28**th **March 2024**, as Skern requires payment at this time.
